Martin Auton Lloyd, CEO of FSW, writes:

We have been able to keep our food bank running and our Support Practitioners working; meeting with families on Zoom, Facebook Live, speaking on the telephone and even shouting from the street through windows 2 metres away! We have sent out food, paid fuel bills, helping families who have seen income drop due to redundancy or reduction in salaries as they were furloughed. However, we know that as the schools go back there will be more families needing support; as the furlough scheme ends there will be more redundancies; we know there will be more families needing FSW and that is why I am asking everyone we know if you would take that extra step with us so that we can maintain our current work and, more importantly, increase our availability for those who will need us for the first time in their lives.

£31 pays for the average family to receive one-to-one support for a week. £310 will allow us to support a family for 10 weeks. This support may be the difference between just surviving and starting to thrive. Maybe you would consider supporting us on a regular basis. A Gift Aid donation of £25 a month would pay for FSW to support a family for 10 weeks of the year; could you commit to this and help provide vital support to a family?

During lockdown our 11 Practitioners across Sussex have given intensive support to 194 families and a total of 459 children. As the schools reopen and problems come to light we expect this to increase and we really do need to be ready to meet that demand.

The September update from Bible Society

Kristin Stevenson writes:

We would like to encourage you with news from Mu Weixu, a pastor in China.

Yes, Lord Jesus, I am willing to serve you!' Mu Weixuisa, 33 year old preacher, who lives in a mountainous area of Yunnan province in China. He was facing many challenges even before the coronavirus outbreak. How easy do you think it would be to say, 'Yes, Lord Jesus, I am willing to serve you!' if you are a poor preacher living in a rural area? You'd have to give up all your farming income to go out and preach the gospel.

Mu also has a wife and new-born baby son to support too. When Covid-19 started spreading, the mountains preachers

like Mu had to climb to continue their God-given mission which suddenly got much bigger. The suspension of all church meetings during the lockdown meant the income of preachers like Mu evaporated. These situations can lead to rural preachers



abandoning much-needed ministries in order to survive. And in China there is already a huge shortage of trained pastors, with just one trained leader for every 6,700 Christians.

Mu admits he was tempted to quit to seek a better paid job in the city, especially after the birth of his baby. But he kept going, lifted up by the generosity, both in donations and in prayer, of Christians thousands of miles away in England and


